A message from Mr Dunn



Year 3



We have reached the 'half-way' point! Time goes so quickly, we are half way through year 3 and it is incredible how amazing your children are doing with their learning and behaviour. We are also incredibly lucky to have booked a Mayan Workshop on the 12th March. More details will be sent out about this after half term! Very exciting news.


Year 4

Year 5



We have made it to half term! This week, we have thoroughly enjoyed exploring 3D shapes and their nets in maths. In English, we have been working extremely hard towards our King Lear playscript and they look fantastic! In geography, year 5 have all shown their creative side and designed 3D masterpieces of a river and all its features. Check these out on dojo!

Lastly, we have enjoyed a fantastic finish in English watching the Wind in the Willows! You've worked hard this term year 5, have a well-deserved half term!

Year 6



Wow what a term! The children have worked so hard this term. We began our new topic all about mountains around the world. Did you know there was a mountain on every continent? In addition to learning about how mountains are formed, where they are, locating their countries and cities and investigating the climate we have used the topic as inspiration for our reading and English. The book 'My Side of the Mountain' by Jean Craighead George has been our reading book as well as our inspiration for our diary and short story writing. In reading, we have learned all about Mount Everest, Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay. In science, we have learned all about animal and plant classification, the scientist Carl Linnaeus (responsible for the classification system) and microorganisms - fantastic topic. This term we introduced the CGP books for homework. Most children have responded really well and we hope that the extra practice gives them an added layer of confidence with their learning. Next term, we really need to think SATs so we are inviting you in to find out more about what the SATs expectations are. There will be two meeting times: 3.30pm and 5.30pm on Monday 4th March. The children were very keen for you to 'have a go', there will be no expectation for you to do so but it will give you an idea of the expectations and why we would like you to encourage children to read and complete the homework. 
Keeping children safe online

A Parent's Guide to Fake News


















Young people can very easily be dragged into things without parental guidance and support.
